MY FIRST DAY

Your first day at secondary school will be one you will always remember so follow these steps to make it a success!

The night before:

- Have your bag packed, including your pencil case
- Have your uniform laid out ready
- Check that you know how you are getting to school and who you are travelling with
- Set your alarm to allow you plenty of time to get up and ready.



Finding your way around:

Heron Hall Academy is a big place compared to your primary school so it will take you a little while to find your way around the buildings. When you start on your first day your form tutor will give you lots of information. You will be surprised just how quickly you will get to know your way around the school.





This seems to be one of the biggest fears when you start at Heron Hall but this is something that you do not need to worry about. Equipment

Things you will be expected to bring:

- A school bag to carry all your books and equipment. It should be large enough to carry A4 size books and folders.
- Pencil case with all your stationary inside
- Your student planner- this must be carried at all times and is used to record homework and other information.

What to leave at home:

- Jewellery apart from a watch and 2 small stud earrings (no hoop) which must NOT be worn for PE. Please do not wear any special watches and earrings-save these for your best occasions.
- If you must bring a phone, it must be turned off and put out of sight during the school day. Inappropriate use will lead to confiscation. The school takes no responsibility for phones.
- Chewing gum
- Tippex
- Felt pens

We really do advise that uniform and equipment is prepared the night before. This reduces stress and avoids last minute panic.

Here are some tips for success:

- Pack your bag the night before and get your uniform ready.
- Make sure you eat some breakfast so that you are full of energy.
- Always arrive on time. Lateness is not acceptable, although, we will understand if you get a bit lost in the first couple of weeks.
- You will have a morning break and it is a good idea to eat a snack and have a healthy drink (No fizzy or energy drinks are permitted in school).
- Bring along a packed lunch or money to buy lunch in the Juice Box diner. If you are entitled to free school meals then lunch will be provided for you.
- School finishes at 3:30pm but there are lots of clubs to join and we really recommend you try as many as possible.

Once you have had some ideas, add your thoughts around your picture.



These are the times of the school day. We have school bells throughout the day but you must always wait for the teachers permission before leaving the classroom.



Science Challenge - Grow your own vegetables from leftovers!

There are a number of vegetables that will regrow from vegetable scraps. In order to grow vegetables on your window sill, select any of the vegetables from the list below and cut them off about 1-2 cm from the root.

Cutting the vegetables should, as a minimum, be supervised by an adult. For some children it may be more suitable for the adult to cut the vegetable.

Put the vegetable root down in a dish/saucer/jam jar with a few millimetres of water in it. Put it on the window sill and watch it grow. You might like to try 2-3 different vegetables to see which ones grow best.

Vegetables that you can grow on a saucer or in a jam jar on a window ledge:

- Carrots
- Leeks
- Onions
- Romain Lettuce / Cabbage
- Fennel
- Garlic (whole clove)



MOBILE PHONES IN SCHOOL

We recognise that you are becoming more independent which means that you may have your own mobile phone. You are responsible not only for the safe keeping of this but also for ensuring it remains in your bag and switched off so is not seen or heard during the school day.

If you are caught using your mobile phone during school hours it will be confiscated and taken to Reception/Student Services where it will be collected by your parent/carer.





Student Planner and Homework

You will be issued with a Student Planner when you join Heron Hall Academy in September. This is an important piece of your daily equipment and must be carried with you every day.

Your planner will have various pieces of information that students and parents need to know:

- Timing of the school day
- Your timetable
- Homework pages
- Pages for notes from parents.



Up until now you will not have had to refer to a timetable. Each student is given an individual timetable which will give you details of which lessons you have, where you have these lessons and when. You will also have different teachers for different lessons too. For example, you will be taught sometimes in special rooms like the workshop for Technology, cooking in the kitchen and Science in the laboratories. This is why it is important that all of this information is carried in your planner with you at all times.

You will also be asked to do some homework after most lessons. When homework is issued by a subject teacher you must write it down in your student planner.

After each piece of homework is complete you must ask your parent/guardian to sign your planner to show that they are happy you have completed your homework on time and to a good standard.

Student planners are checked weekly by your form tutor to see if they have been filled out correctly and signed by your parent/carer.

If you lose your planner you will be expected to purchase a new one - please take care of it.



ATTENDANCE AND LATENESS


You should be in school by 8.30am every day. If lessons have already started when you get to school, you must go to Reception instead to sign in.

How will you ensure you will be at school on time?







She wiggled her fingers experimentally, but she couldn't feel them properly and was unsure whether they were actually wiggling at all and the darkness made it impossible to check. When she could finally leave her hiding place, she had the horrible thought that she would simply fall over as soon as she tried to get up. If she wasn't so terrified, she might have laughed.

How had she ended up like this? What had possessed her to get involved in such a perilous adventure? Why hadn't she just stayed in bed, warm and safe, with functioning limbs and digits? What had she been thinking? The truth was, she hadn't been thinking – well not properly thinking – when Taylor had asked her to join him in what he described as 'the greatest adventure of all time'. 


