Eco-Schools Committee

The Eco-Schools group has been a student group from all year groups across the school working towards a greener and more sustainable Heron Hall Academy. Initially, starting with a small group of around 5 students the group grew in size to around 20 students. These students attended Fortnightly Eco-Committee Meetings and work towards becoming 'Global Citizens'. An audit took place to find out student views about environmental matters; litter and recycling came out as top issues that students wanted to tackle.







The Eco-Committee prepared an Action Plan to help tackle the issues raised. Students created an action plan for improvement at Heron Hall Academy using resources from the online Eco-Schools Toolkit. This led to the group achieving the Eco-Schools Bronze Award due to the work in school to promote environmental awareness.

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A number of litter picks around the school took place to raise awareness of litter and to try and reduce the amount of litter on the school grounds, with the students participating in the annual big spring clean, run by the Tidy Britain Group.

Recycling of materials, including paper and plastics were identified as areas to target following the audit. The Eco-Committee completed a recycling project along with promotional material to raise awareness of the need for recycling in the school and to try and cut down on single use plastics.

As part of the committee students led on a number of environmental initiatives and encouraged staff and students to recycle. From small beginnings, with a small number of students and teachers recycling, students campaigned for green recycling bins in every classroom and office. Ecocommittee members then visited classes weekly to collect recycling.







To promote recycling and in collaboration with the Art department a Van Gough Picture was created from bottle tops collected from recycling. This linked into ideas of 'plastic in the oceans' studies in Geography alongside resource use and recycling in Design and Technology and Science. A biodiversity bee and butterfly café is planned for an area of the school for wildflowers to grow and to help promote biodiversity.

Since this time litter has reduced around the School and this led the Eco-Committee to start on the next stage of the project with students coming up with the slogan 'Clean Up Queensway'. Letters were drafted for the local businesses and shops as well as for the council. Recently, students have completed a litter pick in the local area and hope to continue with this community work over the next few weeks as lockdown eases to work towards completing the Silver Eco-Schools Award.
