I believe that our pupils will continue to flourish and become people who reach their full potential and are ready to go into the world and make positive contributions to the common good and social justice. ## **Year 10 Geography Field Work**

As part of their GCSE course the Year 10s have to study about regeneration in a local area and then as part of their fieldwork they go out to investigate a site. Just before Christmas the Year 10s did an excellent job looking at the regeneration of nearby Stratford as part of the Olympic Site and the impact that this has had on the local area and the local economy. Students completed environmental quality surveys and did a questionnaire outside the station which involved approaching and interviewing members of the public. They were confident and polite. 


## Art & Design so far this Year...




## **Drama Workshops with Chicken Shed Theatre**




## **Author Visit**

#### **Barclay's Life Skills Workshops**

The Year 10 Students have spent this term learning about money. Barclay's bank run a series of sessions for students about money, risk, fraud and debt. Students had external providers from a charity called the Talent Foundry come in to talk to them about vitally important subjects that will help them in the future. In the first session they learnt about credit cards, debt and how to make sure that they don't spend beyond their means. They then looked at incomings and outgoings on their payslip and taxation in the second session before going on to look at financial risks and fraud. In the final session the students looked at the future of money and where it could go in the future. It was fascinating to see the students learn about how far money had come in the last few decades and be amazed by the idea that even 10 years ago we paid by cheques and mobile phones didn't rule the world.

## **Fun in Science**

Heron Hall was lucky enough to be selected to have a presentation from the Royal Institution. Only a very small number of schools are chosen to have a presentation each year so this was a really big honour for the school. The Royal Institution's science presenter Chloe, took the year 7 and 8 students on an exciting journey through the stores of energy which surround us. From elastic to gravitational, kinetic to chemical, they saw some fiery and explosive demonstrations of what energy is and how it affects our lives.

## **Learn with the Lords**


A select group of Year 9 and 10 Citizenship students had the chance to take part in a question and answer session with Lord Balfe. Lord Balfe is a Conservative Peer who sits in the House of Lords but has previously been an MEP and a representative of the Trade Unions. He answered wide ranging questions on the purpose and function of the House of Lords, the role of Government in British Society, the EU referendum and current events in Ukraine. It was great for students to be able to put their questions to a British Politician and they came up with some thoughtful and insightful questions. Arafat Khan in Year 10 asked the best question of the day grilling Lord Balfe on the role of Trade Unions within the Conservative Party.



## **Holocaust Memorial Day**

Back in February the History department organised a highly successful talk with Holocaust Survivor Ziggy Shipper. Although he now suffers from dementia his story was told beautifully and powerfully by his daughter Michelle. The students were able to hear about Ziggy's suffering in the death camp Auschwitz and the horrors that he went through. Having read the Boy in the Striped Pyjamas in Year 7 this helped to bring alive the real pain, anguish and terror that the millions of Jews went through.

We were also meant to have a visit from Arek Hersch on his way back up from the meeting the queen. However, this had to be shortened to a prerecorded message due to fears over COVID-19 at the beginning of the year.



## **Sustainability at Heron Hall Eco-Committee**

A group of students meet weekly across all year groups meet weekly to discuss issues linked to the environment and work to try and improve sustainability across the School. Each floor of Heron Hall Academy has a team of recyclers who visit each room daily to collect any recycling that is placed into the green recycling bins by staff.

Students also encourage teachers to turn off projectors at the end of lessons to try and reduce bulb loss and energy waste. Students have also written letters to the canteen to try and discourage the use of disposable plastics. As well as monitoring how much energy is being produced by the solar panels on the roof.

Other initiatives to improve the environment has seen students raising the issue of litter around the school and encouraging students to use the bin. Many students have taken part in litter picks around the school grounds with a



Big Christmas Clean at the end of the Christmas Term involving 2 form groups in Year 8 and one in Year 7. Students often help at break and lunch time collecting litter.

Following the Glasgow climate conference students encouraged staff to go green and have a plant in the classroom. The initiative is being called 'Plant Heron'. Resources have been prepared by a student in Year 9 to share with teachers to encourage each teacher to have a plant in their room to help raise environmental awareness and to help with other betters such as wellbeing, air purification and mindfulness. 42 house plants should absorb the same amount of carbon dioxide as is required to charge 1 mobile phone. Plans are in place for next term to increase the number of plants to capture carbon around the school.

Earlier in the term students planted native wildflower seeds around the school grounds to attract and provide sources of nectar for insects and to help improve the environment. In addition to this student in Year 9 have been designing bird boxes and committee members have helped to build a bug hotel and bird boxes over the next few weeks to support biodiversity.
