Headteacher's Welcome Letter

Heron Hall is a place of love, respect and tolerance, a home away from home for your children, somewhere they will be safe and cared for. Our 'family' ethos permeates our provision and free breakfast for staff and students forms a small part of that provision.

As you walk into Heron Hall Academy, I believe you get a feeling of pride, of being somewhere everyone matters, where no one is left behind and where every single student can reach their full potential. Welcome to Heron Hall

Welcome to Heron Hall Academy. We are delighted that you have chosen to join us and are so excited to welcome you into Year 7 and to help guide you throughout your journey at secondary school. We recognise that some things will be different for you when you come to Heron Hall Academy and that change can be both daunting and exciting!

This booklet is designed to get you thinking about those changes and to provide you with useful information that will help you feel more confident.



Your first day at secondary school will be one you will always remember so follow these steps to make it a success!

The night before:

- Have your bag packed, including your pencil case
- Have your named uniform laid out ready
- Check that you know how you are getting to school and who you are travelling with
- Set your alarm to allow you plenty of time to get up and ready.



Finding your way around:

Heron Hall Academy is a big place compared to your primary school so it will take you a little while to find your way around the buildings. When you start on your first day your form tutor will give you lots of information. You will be surprised just how quickly you will get to know your way around the academy.



This seems to be one of the biggest fears when you start at Heron Hall but this is something that you do not need to worry about. Teachers will not get cross if you arrive a few minutes late when you are new – they understand that it takes a little time. Other members of staff or students will help you find your way around. Please do not be afraid to ask a member of staff or someone else to help you.

Subjects are located in specific areas and this makes it easier to find your way around. All of the Science rooms are in the same block and there is an area for Maths and an area for English.

BE PREPARED AND ORGANISED!

Impress your teacher by coming to school every day with all you need to learn well and participate fully. Here is a list to help you:

- All books for today's lessons
- Pen
- Pencil
- Ruler
- Rubber
- School diary
- P.E Kit (if needed)
- Pencils
- Calculator / Protractor
- Glue stick
- Water bottle





Don't forget your packed lunch if you choose not to use the school canteen!

LOCKERS

We do not have pegs to leave your belongings on so if you would like a locker then please speak to your Form Tutor on the first day of school and fill out a form.



Things you will be expected to bring:

- A school bag to carry all your books and equipment. It should be large enough to carry A4 size books and folders.
- > Pens, pencils, ruler, pencil sharpener and calculator.
- Your student planner- this must be carried at all times and is used to record homework and other information. Teachers and tutors sometimes use this to communicate with home too.



> PE kit on the day when you have PE

What to leave at home:

- Jewellery apart from a watch and I pair of gold or silver stud earrings (no hoops) which must NOT be worn for PE. Please do not wear any expensive watches and earrings-save these for best.
- If you must bring a phone, it must be turned off and put out of sight during the school day. Inappropriate use will lead to confiscation. The school takes no responsibility for phones.
- chewing gum
- > Tippex
- > Felt pens

We really do advise that uniform and equipment is prepared the night before. This reduces stress and avoids last minute panic.

Here are some tips for success:

- > Pack your bag the night before and get your uniform ready.
- > Make sure you eat some breakfast so that you are full of energy.
- Always arrive on time. Lateness is not acceptable, although, we will understand if you get a bit lost in the first couple of weeks.
- You will have a morning break and it is a good idea to eat a snack and have a healthy drink (No fizzy or energy drinks are permitted in school).
- Bring along a packed lunch or money to buy lunch in the Juice Box diner. If you are entitled to free school meals, then lunch will be provided for you.
- School finishes at 3:30pm but there are lots of clubs to join and we really recommend you try as many as possible.

You will have your photo and finger print taken to pay for your meals in the Canteen. This will be explained by your Form tutor.






Packed Lunches

MOBILE PHONES IN SCHOOL

The only phones that will be allowed in the school are phones <u>without</u> smart technologies. You can purchase one of these phones at very cheap prices at local supermarkets and suppliers.



You will be issued with a Student Planner when you join Heron Hall Academy in September. This is an important piece of your daily equipment and must be carried with you every day.

Your planner will have various pieces of information that students and parents need to know:

- Timing of the school day
- Your timetable
- Homework pages
- Pages for notes from parents.



Up until now, you will not have had to refer to a timetable. Each student is given an individual timetable, which will give you details of which lessons you have, where you have these lessons and when. You will have different teachers for different lessons too. For example, you will be taught sometimes in special rooms like the workshop for Technology, Cooking in the kitchen and Science in the laboratories. This is why it is important that all of this information is carried in your planner with you at all times.

You will be asked to do some homework after most lessons. When a subject teacher issues homework, you must write it down in your student planner.

After each piece of completed homework, you must ask your parent/guardian to sign your planner to show that they are happy you have completed your homework on time and to a good standard.

Student planners are checked weekly by your tutor to see if they have been filled in correctly and signed by your parent/carer.

If you lose your planner you will be expected to purchase a new one – please take care of it.

There is an expectation that you take pride in your work and that you present your work as neatly as possible. Remember that work should have your name on it, a title and a date. Keep your exercise books tidy and do not scribble or doodle on them. You may refer back to this work for revision later in the year so it is important that you take care of all of your work. You should be in school by 8.30am every day. If lessons have already started when you get to school, you must go straight to the Reception to sign in before going to your lesson.

In order to get the most out of school it is essential that you keep your attendance as high as possible. We aim for students to have as near to 100% attendance as possible and **we reward students who manage this.**



Being on time for school and for lessons is important too, it means minimal disruption to teaching and learning.



If you cannot come to school your parents/carer should telephone school and speak to ourAttendance Officer. If the school is not aware of why you are absent they will try to contact your parents/carer to check that you are safe.

The Curriculum

We want the educational experience of all our pupils to be one that raises aspirations and self-belief and enthuses children to become life-long learners.

At Heron Hall Academy, we recognise that students need to study a broad range of subjects to develop into well-informed young people, before they choose their specialisms at GCSE in preparation for their adult lives.

During Key Stage 3, we follow the National Curriculum and students study the following subjects:

- Humanities (Geography, History)

To supplement our curriculum's offer, our school prides itself on our extra-curricular provision. Being able to offer students a wide range of extra-curricular activities is especially important as it encourages our students to become independent, confident, and well-rounded individuals. Students can participate in creative activities as well as sport, dance, computing, languages, and drama. The school provides opportunities for students to learn outside of the classroom and runs several educational visits throughout the year. Trips to date include visits to top Universities, The Globe Theatre, a variety of West End Shows, Geneva, Disneyland Paris and many more.

Furthermore, we have outstanding sporting activities at Heron Hall, which also run as clubs at the end of the school day, encouraging physical activity, having fun and competition. We recently invested \pounds 500,000 in a 4G Astroturf and pupils thoroughly enjoy our outside space and the sporting facilities we offer.

Student achievement is recognised in a variety of ways throughout the year. For day-to-day achievements in class work and home learning, teachers and tutors issue positive merits for students; these merits are recorded onto our school system, certificates are awarded to those who achieve a high number of merits in each form class.

Achievement, progress, and contributing to the school or wider community are seen to be valued and at the heart of school life. They are also within the reach of every student and motivate each to give of their best. Many students have badges on their school blazer that help to show to other students and staff that they have helped to support the school community.

We love to celebrate your successes. We do this in the following ways:

- Praise
- Merits for effort and good work
- Certificates for effort, attendance and achievement
- Assembly Celebration
- Newsletter and letters home
- Postcards home



Sanctions

Visitors to our school frequently comment on the calm and purposeful learning atmosphere that is created and maintained by all that attend the school.

Students are expected to be prompt for school and lessons bringing with them all of the correct equipment for that days learning. Students are expected to wear their uniform correctly at all times including to and from school.

Behaviour at the school is excellent. Students are rewarded for their achievements both inside and outside of the classroom. Where behaviour falls below the expected level, it is resolved using the 'Behaviour for Learning' policy.

Tutor Time

Your tutor is the teacher that you will see every afternoon for 20 minutes at the end of day. You will be part of a tutor group for the whole of Year 7.



On your first day your tutor will give you all the information you need, like planners and timetables. You will have a tutor base where important notices will be displayed and where you will always meet together.

After the first day you will spend the 20 minutes tutor time learning all about what kind of learner you are and you will be given any important news. Your tutor will know you the best and their job is to help you in as many ways as they can.

If your tutor cannot help you or you have any concerns during the school day, then there are two other people to help out Year 7. They are Madam Chalmers who is your Head of Year and the Assistant Head of Year, Madam Mahamroot. You can see them in their office on the Humanities corridor, which is located on the Second Floor, before school, break time, lunch time or after school. Students are not permitted to leave lessons. If you feel ill then you must tell your teacher and 'Medical' will be contacted.

Homework

At Heron Hall Academy, we issue homework on a regular basis. It is an expectation that the students try their hardest and hand in their best effort. This does not mean that we think every evening should be spent slogging away until bedtime. 30 minutes per subject should be encouraged although some subjects may vary. Having said that, if a student is so enthusiastic about a piece of work they want to put in extra time, then it will of course be recognised and rewarded.

Some tips to develop good habits:

- Homework is completed at the same time each night.
- > Always ask a teacher if you don't understand the homework
- Don't leave homework until the last minute and try to complete it as soon as you get it.

Failure to complete homework or hand it in on time will result in a sanction.

Character and Culture

STRIVE

The most important reason that you come to school is to develop your academic performance and prepare for the exams that you will take at the end of your time with us. However, it is not the only reason why school is an important place and one of the key pillars of education at Heron Hall is to develop you as a well-rounded citizen who we can have confidence that you will go out and be successful in every aspect of your life outside of school.

That is why one of the key pillars of life at Heron Hall is to focus on students' character education and to help develop the skills and traits to thrive in the rest of their life after school. The 6 core values that underpin the character education at Heron Hall are:

Supportive – I help my peers and my teachers Tolerant – I respect other people's differences Resilient – I never give up when it's tough Integrity – I do the right thing all of the time Visionary – I aim higher and further Excellence – I never settle for less than my best



The STRIVE ethos runs through everything that we do at Heron Hall and you will find teachers using the language in lessons to encourage you both academically and pastorally. Each STRIVE value is broken down into a series of traits that we aim for every student leaving Heron Hall Academy to be able to demonstrate. All of the traits and STRIVE values are also linked to the British Values that students learn through their time at school.

We also embed character education through other means including:

- **STRIVE Days**: Throughout the year we run three non-academic days that embed character aspects in students through a variety of means including trips, outside speakers, workshops and lessons.
- **STRIVE Award**: In Year 7, 8 and 9 students have the opportunity to complete activities inside and outside school to achieve Bronze, Silver and Gold STRIVE awards.
- **Volunteering Opportunities**: Through external partnerships we offer opportunities for our students to develop their character through volunteering in the local community.
- Form Time: One of the form time sessions every week is dedicated to Character and Culture and getting students used to the language and discussing key STRIVE topics.
- Assemblies: Each week the assembly will be based on a key topic or issue and linked to one of the STRIVE values.
- **STRIVE Interviews**: When students get into Year 10 we operate STRIVE interviews to help students prepare for life at college or Sixth Form. Through encouraging the use of character language it helps students to develop their interview technique.
- **External Speakers**: Every year we are looking for opportunities of local community speakers and high quality external speakers to come in and speak to the students about key topics.
- **Subject Awards**: We operate a series of opportunities to get involved in specific projects and awards around the school including the eco-project awards, Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and the ArtsMark.

BEING PART OF A HAPPY FAMILY



We want our community to be a happy one! At Heron Hall Academy we expect the following behaviour:

- > Arrive on time, mind your manners and always be polite
- Treat others as you would expect to be treated yourself
- Do not gossip or bully. This is taken very seriously; it is not acceptable and will be dealt with immediately
- > Move around the school quietly and walk on the left side of the corridors
- Line up outside the classroom quietly
- Listen to your teacher and put your hand up if you have a question
- Write your homework in your planner and hand it in on time
