
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JOIN US FOR OUR TERMLY COFFEE MORNING!

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SIXTH FORM GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS EXCEL AT RESIDENTIAL COURSE



We are thrilled to share the remarkable achievements of our sixth form geography students who recently embarked on a memorable 5-day residential course at the Field Studies Council centre in Nettlecombe Court, Somerset. Despite Mr. O'Mahoney's infamous minibus driving, our students fearlessly ventured forth, staying in the historic Tudor mansion and collaborating with two other schools to conduct fieldwork for their Independent Geographical Investigation.

Throughout the week, our students delved into the intricacies of coastal geography, exploring the coastal town of Minehead and dissecting the challenges posed by coastal flooding. Additionally, they investigated the economic resilience of rural areas during the winter months. The students showcased exceptional initiative by collaborating with peers from Mulberry Stepney Green School, with Zuzanna and Ezra providing invaluable support to their counterparts on topics ranging from coastal engineering to the vitality of Minehead's high street.

Thursday proved to be a particularly enriching day as our students autonomously collected data, impressing locals with their polite demeanor and astute inquiries. Their dedication extended beyond fieldwork, as they diligently organised their methodology and prepared for the arduous task of compiling their findings into a comprehensive report upon their return to school.




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SIXTH FORM GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS EXCEL AT RESIDENTIAL COURSE

Mr. O'Mahoney stated that this was the hardest working group of students he has ever taught at A level and is looking forward to their excellent grades at the end of year 13.





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
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OUR STRIVE VALUE FOR THIS HALF TERM IS INTEGRITY










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LITERACY ...AT HERON



Literacy (the ability to read and write fluently) is at the very core of teaching and learning. Through literacy we not only unlock the world around us, but also gain the power to change it; it is the key to helping our students navigate both the classroom and social environments, and as such dwells at the heart of everything we do.

At Heron Hall, a great deal of time has been devoted to ensuring that our students have the best chance at achieving high levels of literacy and developing a love of reading. All students up until Year 10 have dedicated library lessons where they can develop their love of language and literature, guided by both their English teachers and our devoted library staff. Reading ages are regularly tested in order to identify any challenges our students are facing, and additional support in the form of additional literacy lessons and EAL sessions led by experienced experts is always at the ready to ensure they continue to develop.

But the teaching of literacy is not solely the concern of our English and Library staff; from History to Science, from Maths to PE, from Design Technology to Modern Foreign Languages, in every classroom we see literacy being taught and proudly displayed on our literacy walls, there to guide and build confidence in our young readers, arming them with the words they need to secure their futures.

Meanwhile, outside of the classroom, our spectacular library staff are constantly innovating new ways to drive the literacy rate of our children. Having unleashed the Word Millionaires competition, which recognises and rewards our high achieving readers, March will bring a Book Swap Party to the school, giving our community and readers the chance to share the books and stories they love with others, all the while discovering new sources of inspiration.

Finally, with World Book Day and its many dedicated activities, costumes and glamour fast approaching, it would be remiss of me not to mention our visionary writers in both the First Story and Young Writers club, which have produced incredible, publishable work. As part of the First Story Programme, in which pupils work alongside a published poet to create their own published anthology, a group of twelve students will be travelling with myself and Mr Bowstead to the illustrious Cambridge University for a day of creative writing workshops and live talks by the movers and shakers of the literary world. As a teacher, this trip is always the highlight of the year for me; there is nothing so inspiring as watching our students walking the grounds of the celebrated university and knowing that one day, soon, they'll be able walk them not as guests, but alumni.


